UVA Teams Earn Spots in Finals

U.Va. Men's Team remains undefeated

The U.Va. men's team has been on an incredible winning streak since September of 2007. Having lost in an upset to Cornell in the semi-finals at the Kentucky Horse Park during the 2007 national finals, U.Va. men have had a perfect record ever since. Captain Joevy Beh, along with Mauricio Diaz, Strother Scott, CB Scherer, and Mauricio Lopez finished last year's season undefeated with a win over Texas A&M at the 2008 national tournament. This year we added new recruit Felipe Viana to the squad. His talent as a player has given us incredible depth.

We completed our fall season undefeated with decisive regular season wins over Cornell, Harvard, University of Kentucky, Uconn, and Colorado State. The men finished their season by competing in the William Field Tournament held at Cornell University each fall. In their first match U.Va. beat Uconn 23 to 7. Their second

match was against Colorado State. The score was 22 to 13. In the finals U.Va. faced off against last year's national finalist Texas A&M with a final score of 21 to 10 in favor of U.Va.

VA POLO BOOT CAMP by Sarah Pergolizzi

As I was myself a graduate of the Virginia Polo Boot Camp, I was happy to take over the reins this past semester and to instruct Virginia Polo's newest players. This past Fall proved to be an especially strong season for the Boot Camp program. There was a wide variety of students – they ranged from first years in the college to first years in Darden business school, and everything in between; there were boys (well, one boy) and girls; and there were ex-patriots of the Virginia riding team, students who hadn't ridden since middle school, and one student who didn't have any substantial prior riding experience.

While their backgrounds differed, every single student this year was eager to learn the game, a quick and courageous learner, and a smiling face each, early Saturday morning at the barn. They enthusiastically tackled each new swing, despite sore wrists and less-than-clear faculties after fun Friday nights. Many stayed for Saturday afternoon games to see the strokes and rules they were learning come to life. The students this year were brave enough to make big mistakes, learn from those mistakes, and subsequently, they all became polo players.

Lou and I worked hard to prepare the Boot Campers fully for the Spring semester on the Club team, and our organization of the lessons worked beautifully. We began the lessons with a riding lesson and a hitting lesson on Woody, the trusted wooden horse of Virginia Polo. The hunter-jumpers of the group were uncomfortable at first with the polo seat, but they picked it up quickly. The next few lessons involved a slow introduction of each of the four polo shots, with careful attention to detail. The students learned to get their behinds out of their saddles, but they also learned this hitting technique's importance in ensuring the safety of the horse and the accuracy of the swing. Throughout the lessons, the students not only learned that they must do certain things; they also learned why they must do them.

The lessons ended with an explanation of the rules, and practice chukkers in which we enforced those rules and explained them in context. The chukkers were slow at first, with many whistles for crossing of the line and riding into swings. However, by the third lesson of chukkers, the students were cantering, hooking, riding off, and circling back once they missed the ball.

This Fall's Boot Campers are all prepared to join the Club this Spring, and while I haven't yet received confirmation from everyone, we are already at a 50% retention rate. Historically speaking, for at least the years that I've been in the club and helped out with the Boot

New Opportunities – Va Polo was recently accepted by the USPA as a Regional Training Center (RTC). As such, Va Polo will receive financial assistance from the USPA for providing facilities to teach polo, hold instructor/umpire training, to host tournaments, etc. We look forward to working with the USPA in a manner that benefits both organizations.

Community Support – The Va Polo community is far reaching and is a key reason why our program remains so strong. During the last twelve months, our community established the Rinehart Polo Pony Fund (donations and pledges exceed \$115,000); constructed an eight (8) stall barn dedicated to Rodger Rinehart; established a fund for club members new to polo; and donated time and expertise to improve the organization.

Even with the above positive news, changes needed to be made in order to negotiate the financial realities of today. Specifically, dues were increased and the string was decreased to an optimal size. Going forward, our 2010 budget is being crafted with a critical eye on costs since some outside revenue sources (ie, benefit games and summer facility leasing) have stopped for the near term.

Even with prudent financial planning, Va Polo will continue to depend on Annual Giving to fund 20%+ of its operating budget. As such, Va Polo needs your financial support now more than ever. Please keep us at the top of your year-end charitable contribution plans, whether cash or securities.


Rinehart Pony Fund
